Quick facts

- NZ has around 4 species of native bees from the genus *Lasioglossum*.
- Each type has their own *unique* characteristics, but they are all very tiny compared to other bees.
- They are commonly called *sweat bees*, because on hot summer days they like to sup human sweat when ever they get a chance.
- Mother bees make their nests in the ground, and often more than one female bee will help to raise baby bees. In this regard, they are described as *semi-social*.
- Mother bees overwinter, and in the summer baby bees emerge as fully grown adults.
- Sweat bees carry pollen on their fluffy tummy and their hairy legs.
- They love native flowers and introduced flowers and are not especially fussy.
